Throughout his life George would enjoy a close relationship with both his parents. George graduated from Yates High School where he enjoyed much success in the areas of mathematics and electronics. George learned to love electronics through his father, who operated a small electronics repair shop in Sunnyside. Following high school, George attended Prairie View A&M University and majored in electrical engineering. While at Prairie View, George once again became well known for his intellectual abilities and electronics expertise. George became an urban legend on campus when he was electrocuted on the roof of the girl's dorm attempting to repair their television antennae. Coincidentally, lightning struck twice that year because it was then that he met the love of his life, Dora Sue Ward, a freshman at the university. He often told his children stories of how he fell in love with her from the very first moment he laid eyes on her. George would walk from Sunnyside to Acres Homes in his pursuit of love. They were married in 1963, and enjoyed a happy union for over fifty-two years. Their first child was born in 1965 and it was then that George returned to college to pursue a degree in mathematics from The University of Texas. George and Dora had three children: Angelia, Wanda, and George, II. He believed that his children had the ability to fulfill any dream as long as they were committed, exhibited patience, and worked hard to achieve their goals. He pushed his children in

school and in life. George was an excellent father who never hesitated to help his children in their endeavors. George shared his love of fishing with his children and granddaughter who received her first fishing lesson when she was only 3 years old. In 1991 George began a new chapter in his life when he was blessed with the birth of his grand-daughter, Brittney Quezada. He cherished his time with Brittney taking the time to teach her computer programming as a very young child. He marveled at her intelligence and spoke about her accomplishments incessantly. Brittney and her grandfather shared a very special bond from birth. Oftentimes, as a small baby, she would cry and cry until George would send Dora upstairs to retrieve her from her room. Once in his arms she would smile and the two would stay up all night watching Star Trek and movies until the early dawn. George loved Brittney with all his heart. She can find comfort in knowing that he will serve as her guardian angel watching over her from heaven. Throughout his career as an electrical and software engineer he worked for many of the top aerospace companies. His first job at Schlumberger convinced him that he needed a degree to achieve his dream of working on complex electronics. In fact, he was one of Schlumberger's first black employees. He received his degree in mathematics from Texas Southern University. Over the course of his career he worked for such companies as NASA (Houston and Florida); McDonnell Douglas; Boeing; Lear Jet; Lucas Oil (England); Lockheed Martin; BAE Systems; and, E-Systems Corporation. Early in his career he formed a lasting friendship with Herbert and Margie Duke. He and Herbert worked on many contracts together. Both men worked at many of the same companies. Their families would enjoy a special closeness that continues to this day. Always the dreamer, he formed a construction company in 1975. Given his entrepreneurial spirit from his father, he went on to form his own engineering firms in the 1980's. Durden Technical Services and Data Technical Systems sought and received government contracts. George wanted to leave a legacy for his children and employed them in his businesses. He taught them to use the computer, learn processing software, and exposed them to the early

internet (ARPANET). George loved to travel. In fact, he infected his children with the travel bug early in their lives. He lived and worked in places like New York, New Jersey, Michigan, England, Seattle, California, Arizona, Minnesota, Florida, Alabama, and Wisconsin. His home base would always be Houston because of his love for his family and friends that resided there. Like his father, George loved to fish. He and his friends, Johnny Stewart, Sam Ellis, and Herman Jenkins would often go to Freeport, San Luis Pass or area lakes to enjoy a day of fishing. Often his children and nephews were invited to tag along. He believed that children needed to have knowledge of simple things in life that could bring satisfaction and relaxation. George loved his family. He loved his wife, children, nieces and nephews. He cherished, loved, and respected his father and mother until their deaths. He loved his sisters Judieth and Patricia. The time he spent with George Nelson, II (Bubba) were some of the best times of his life. The two would work on cars and construction projects together. He often remarked that Bubba was a genius when it came to working on cars. Shelia always had a special place in his heart. He talked about her sweetness and goodness as a person. He loved her coconut-pineapple cakes. He looked forward to Portia's daily sports reports and was very proud of her career and world travels. George met his future son-in-law, Mark Kramer, in 2005.
