

Robert Allen Wahl Jr.

November 7, 1927 - December 17, 2023

Robert Allen Wahl Jr (Al) passed away peacefully at 96 years of age. Born November 7, 1927, Al enjoyed a full life of accomplishments. Growing up in Oak Park IL, Al began his football career at Oak Park High School later to become a two time All American at the University of Michigan in 1949 and 1950. Al joined the Wolverines football team as a freshman in 1945, then spent the following two years in service with the US Army in Germany. Upon returning to the football field in 1948 to a National Championship, Al picked up the nickname "Brick" Wahl. He was named team captain in 1950 and led Michigan to a Big 10 Championship and a Rose Bowl win. In 2004, he was inducted in the University of Michigan Hall of Honor.

During his service with the US Army, Al also became the US Army heavyweight champion in the European theatre, winning four fights to gain the title.

He returned to Oak Park to enter the workforce and met his wife Karen Muller of Evanston IL,

to whom he remained married to for 70 happy years. After many professional endeavors, he moved with his wife and family to Omaha NE and worked for Valmont Industries. He joined the company in 1965 as Vice President of Marketing and was named President and Chief Operating Officer in 1977. Al served until 1985 helping expand the company into the international marketplace affording both he and his wife many exciting adventures overseas and driving Valmont to become a Fortune 500 company. Upon leaving Valmont, he moved his family to Dallas, TX acquiring a \$60 million dollar sales distribution company, Why Not Better Paper Products. After successfully restructuring the company and making strategic acquisitions, he negotiated the sale of the company to a British conglomerate.

Upon his retirement, he and Karen enjoyed all that Dallas had to offer and made many lasting friends. They spent their summers in Steamboat Springs Colorado playing golf, tennis and hiking. Right to the end, Al remained active in serving as an independent consultant and in his enjoyment of vigorous political debates to keep his mind sharp. Al was liked by all that knew him and was always the life of the party.

Al and Karen had three children: Mark C Wahl, Mari Wahl Henry and Robert Allen Wahl III. His youngest son, Rob preceded him in death in April 2021. He is survived by his

years, son Mark Wahl, daughter Mari Henry, son in law David Henry, and daughter in law

Cherie Wahl (Rob's Wife), as well as grandchildren, Max Barretto, Cooper Wahl, Spencer Wahl

and Christopher Wahl, and great grandchild Ruston Wahl (Cooper and Jenny Wahl).

He will be loved always, sorely missed, and not forgotten.

“ When I met Al Wahl, I was an 18-year-old, just starting my sophomore year in college, and had also just started dating his daughter Mari. He was a senior executive at one of the largest companies in Nebraska. On paper, I would’ve been relieved if he had been willing to give me the time of day.

Instead, he treated me, from the start, as a fellow human being. He had an easy smile and a manner that said, without words, that since we are sharing this moment in time, let it be lighthearted and fun.

As I recall, the first or second time I ever saw him was at a party he and Karen had for their friends. I was stunned when he invited Mari and me to join him the next morning on the company jet, where he was going to a same-day conference at the Broadmoor in Colorado Springs. Which we did. Even now, it is hard for me to appreciate what a generous compliment he had given me.

It was certainly not the last one. I always felt welcome in his home and at his table. We discussed great matters of the day, as equals. He found me a good summer job at his company in Valley, Nebraska. Little did my co-workers know that I also spent time that summer playing tennis with Al – a man at the opposite end of our place in the corporate hierarchy.

By then, I had discovered (though not because he ever mentioned it) that he was an All-American captain of the Michigan team that won the Rose Bowl in 1951. (Their defensive tackle’s nickname was “Brick” Wahl.) And that he’d been the heavyweight boxing champion of the Army. When I asked him about those accomplishments, he didn’t dwell on the many stories of personal glory he might have told. They seemed to bemuse him, as if they had happened to somebody else. It is fitting that his Wolverines just won the national championship – as his undefeated 1948 team had also done.

I am fortunate to have known Big Al Wahl. I am fortunate that he treated me, always, as a friend. My good memories, and my respect

and affection for him, are among the treasures he's left me.

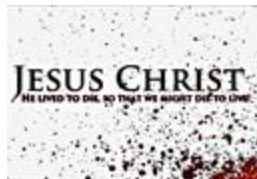
