We pulled the canoes ashore and went to sleep. We woke up in the morning and the canoes were gone. None of us thought the river might rise during the night because of the tide. After we stopped laughing, Sheri was wise enough to take out the breakfast provisions, and started to walk down river hoping the canoes would eventually end up and the dock where we were supposed to drop them off. We had no idea how far it was down the river to the dock. As we started walking, the day got hotter, we didn't have any water and there was no end in site. After what seemed liked hours, we found the boat and our cars. We had walked for nearly two hours. We were tired, hot and sweaty, and couldn't wait to get home to clean up. It was a great adventure and tons of fun.
